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Keyboarding At Andrew High School

Every year, the eighth-grade classes at our feeder schools attend a step up day at Andrew High School. During their visit, they are subjected to a keyboarding competency test. Although there are a few students who can keep up with our student leaders, a majority of the students are far behind the production of our current students.

Last January, Andrew students were performing speed drills that tallied 60 to 75 words per minute. Our Keyboarding/Word Applications course has always produced efficient typists. The course also provides fundamentals for using the Microsoft Word program as a professional word processing tool. Another benefit of taking the course is receiving college credit at Moraine Valley free of charge. Some students may receive 3 hours of credit for OSA 249 if they receive an A, B, or C in the course.

Mrs. Dovantzis, who is a current teacher and former student of VJA, had this to say about the keyboarding class, *"Out of all the classes I took while I was a student at Andrew, Keyboarding is one of the skills I learned that I still use on a daily basis. I have even had colleagues compliment me on how fast I type!"*

Throughout college, being able to type quickly and accurately saved me so much time while completing research papers, journals, and projects. I encourage students to take Keyboarding while they are in high school because it is such an important skill and will help them save time, make them more competitive when applying for jobs, and they will use what they learn for the rest of their lives."

Dress Code

As the weather continues to improve, please consider reviewing what is appropriate clothing for school. Reviewing pages 63-64 of the student handbook will lay out what is appropriate clothing for the school environment:

Students' dress and grooming must not disrupt the educational process, interfere with the maintenance of a positive teaching/learning climate, or compromise reasonable standards of health, safety, and decency. If a style of dress or grooming appears to be disruptive to the educational process, it will not be permitted in school. The Dean's decision is final regarding student appearance.

The following examples are offered as guidelines for appropriate school attire:

1. Pants must be worn at the waist (i.e., while standing, walking, and sitting, top attire must touch bottom attire all the way around).
2. All undergarments must be covered by opaque outer attire.
3. Shoes must be worn in school at all times. Footwear that damages floor surfaces will not be allowed.
4. Clothing that is inappropriate, provoking, dangerous, distracting, to or that creates a disturbance to the educational process (e.g.: displays or condones anti-social, immoral, or illegal behavior, or promotes or condones alcohol, tobacco, drugs, profanity, sex, death, gangs, etc.) will not be permitted. "Off-color" or defamatory slogans related to ethnicity, culture, gender, etc. on clothing are also prohibited.
5. Head coverings of any kind are not to be worn at any time in the building, unless required for religious or medical reasons. This includes all indoor extra-curricular events. These items should be removed immediately upon entering the school building, and should not be put on (or carried) until exiting the building at the end of the day.
6. Sunglasses must not be worn in the building.
7. Wallet chains and spiked jewelry will not be permitted.
8. Outdoor jackets or coats of any type will not be worn or carried to class or anywhere in the building and should be stored in the students' locker during the regular school day.
9. Skirts, dresses, shirts worn with leggings, or shorts must extend below the fingertips/arms hanging to the side and must ride over the hips. The same rule will apply to slits in the skirt.
10. Tops must cover shoulders and back and not be revealing. Spaghetti straps are not allowed. Armholes must not be revealing.



Lockers

All hallway and PE lockers must be cleaned out on the last day of school. The summer allows for maintenance to be completed on lockers. Any items not removed from lockers by students may be removed and thrown away.

Final transcript requests will be fulfilled through www.parchment.com for all seniors this year. Step-by-step instructions will be available in the guidance department in hard copy, as well as accessible on the guidance website electronically.

Student Records

Temporary student records are kept for five (5) years after graduation. These include test scores, interest inventories, and demographic data. Permanent records of semester grades and attendance are kept for sixty years.

Selective Service

Federal law requires all male students to register with the Selective Service System when they turn 18. Registration takes place by filling out the appropriate form at the Post Office. Those who do not register face fines or jail, and are not eligible for student financial aid.



PSAT & National Merit Competition

Juniors who would like to be considered for National Merit Scholarships, and like awards from the National Merit competition, should plan to take the PSAT test in October. Information about the

exam will be sent out from the Guidance Office. Interested sophomore students may sign up for this test but their results will not enter them into the National Merit competition.

Homework For College Bound Juniors

If they have not already done so, this is the summer when college-bound juniors should be narrowing their college choices. Summer is a great time to visit campuses in order to talk to college representatives.

Many families plan vacations based on possible college choices. Remember to call ahead, or go online, to arrange a tour and an interview so as to get the most out of your visit.

Summer School

Summer school registration for the second semester of summer school continues through early June. We encourage students to sign up as soon as possible in order to guarantee a spot in one of the courses that will be offered. Courses

may be cancelled before the deadline due to low enrollment. Please do not wait to sign up! Summer school registration information and enrollment forms are available in the Guidance Office and on the district website.

National Defense Authorization Act

This act allows military representatives to ask for unedited lists of juniors and seniors. The school will provide student directory information unless parents send a letter to

the Guidance Office indicating that they do not want their child's name and directory information provided to military recruiters.

Scholarships

The deadline for most of the Honors Night scholarships may have passed, but additional applications continue to arrive in the Guidance Office. We encourage seniors to stop in and check out the scholarship file in Guidance for newly

arrived scholarship applications. It may not be too late to earn additional money based on excellent achievement in high school. Scholarships are also listed on the Guidance website.

Guidance Summer Hours

The Guidance Office is open throughout the summer in a limited capacity. Counselors are available by appointment only as their schedules are very limited. To set up an appointment with your son or daughter's counselor, or if you have questions about residency or other guidance related issues, please call 342-5821. Please note that the building will be closed on Fridays during the summer.

Nurse's Office

Nurse Requires Health Records For Incoming Freshmen

According to Illinois School Code, all **incoming freshmen** must have a complete physical prior to entry into high school, including an up-to-date immunization record, before receiving a class schedule. All students are required to have:

- Two (2) doses of Measles, Mumps and Rubella vaccine (MMR) given on or after the 1st birthday
- Polio vaccine series with booster given on or after the 4th birthday
- Tetanus Diphtheria, Pertussis series with Tdap booster
- Three (3) doses of Hepatitis B vaccines according to the required schedule
- Two (2) doses of Varicella vaccine given on or after the 1st birthday
- One (1) dose of Meningococcal vaccine on or after the 11th birthday

The form for the physical is two sided.

- Your physician must sign and date to verify the immunization record, and again after the physical portion with his/her stamp, including phone number.
- Parents must also complete and sign a comprehensive health history. This is a mandated portion of the state's physical form and it is on the top of the second page of the physical. Please be sure that all signatures are present before returning your form to school.
- The nurse is required by law to **RETURN** any physicals **NOT** in compliance with the law. **DOUBLE CHECK** that all signatures are present.
- Always make a copy for your records.

Important reminders

- Each student must also have a **pink emergency sheet** on file in the Nurse's Office.
- Please remember that no student will be able to receive their schedule for the 2019-2020 school year until all medical records are in compliance with the state law and on file in the Nurse's Office.
- Send your forms in as soon as they are

complete to avoid a delay in getting your class schedule.

- The Nurse's Office is closed in the summer. Physical and emergency forms are available in the Main Office, Guidance Office, or online during the summer.
- **Completed forms should be mailed or turned into the Nurse's Office by May 1, 2019.**

Nurse's Office Alert

Attention Junior Parents/ Guardians (class of 2020)

All students entering 12th grade in the State of Illinois are required to show proof of having received one dose of **Meningococcal Conjugate** vaccine given on or after their 16th birthday.

Proof of having received the Meningococcal vaccine is required and should be submitted to the School Nurse as soon as the vaccine is given.

Vaccine documentation can be:

- Dropped off in the Nurse's Office
- Mailed to Victor J. Andrew High School, Attention: Nurse's Office
- Scanned and e-mailed to the Nurse's Office at: vjanurse@d230.org
- Faxed to the Nurse at: 708-737-7725

It is important to note that your child will *not* receive a schedule, participate in athletics, or apply for a parking pass in the 2019-2020 year, until documentation of having the vaccine is received in the Nurse's Office.

Reminder For Freshmen Athletes

Freshman physicals will satisfy both district and athletic department requirements. Sports physicals are valid for 13 months. Athletes do not need a separate sports physical for their freshman year.

- Please make sure the doctor circles YES for inter-scholastic sports.
- This must be done prior to the student trying out for a sport.
- Give a copy to your coach and send the **original** to the Nurse.

Asthma Health Alert

Illinois Law requires an Asthma Action Plan to be completed by a physician for all asthmatic students. Please submit completed forms to the Nurse's Office as soon as possible. Any questions, please call the Andrew Nurse's Office at: 342-5858.

Medications At School

If your student takes medication at school daily, or on an as needed basis, please remember to send a new Medication Form prior to the start of the 2019- 2020 school year. This form must be updated each school year for your student to continue receiving his/her medication.

Seniors – College Immunization Records

A copy of your high school physical/immunization record for college will be included with your graduation diploma. If you need a copy before graduation, please see the nurse. The nurse is not in during the summer months – now is the time to get your copy.

Attention Parents of Sophomore, Junior, and Senior students

If there are any changes in emergency contact or health information, please complete a new pink emergency form and turn it in to the school nurse.

Andrew Athletics Update

On behalf of the administration and staff at VJA, we hope you all had a great Easter holiday! It is hard to believe that the 2018-19 school year is soon coming to a close. As we head into May, seniors are preparing for graduation, juniors are starting to think about what's next after high school, sophomores are looking forward to getting their driver's license, and freshmen are very much looking forward to not being freshmen anymore! We have had a great start to our spring season with lots of competitive action and great wins. Very soon, our programs will be competing in the IHSA postseason and we wish them the best of luck. Finally, please go to our school website for registration information for our 2019 summer camps. We look forward to seeing our future T-Bolts at all of our youth camps this summer.

The Girls' Soccer program has, once again, proven to be one of the most competitive in the area and in the state. At about the halfway point in the season, the three levels have combined for a record of 20-4-2. The Varsity wrapped up the Windy City Ram Classic a couple of weeks ago. While they did not win the 32 team tournament, they did only allow 1 goal in 5 games. They are now involved in the PepsiCo Showdown where they were seeded in the top ten of over 60 teams. They are 1-1 with the loss coming to the #1 seeded team. They also competed for Tinley Wish against Bradley. After the tournament, SWSC Red Division play will be underway.

The Andrew Softball program is in full swing of the season. All levels continue to improve each game and complete at the highest level. SWSC Red Conference play is underway as the Varsity and JV look to capture the conference title. The Varsity team will be competing in the ICA Greg Easter Invitational on May 10-11. This is a highly competitive tournament with teams from all four classes of IHSA. Please come out and support your girls as they continue this season.

The Boys' D230 Gymnastics program came off a great week after hitting their high score of the season with a 121.4 lead by Sawyer Mackovitch and Ethan Ryan. The Varsity team headed to Conference on April 18, while hosting the Freshmen and JV Conference April 20. The team looked forward to Sectionals at Lyons Township on April 30, where they hoped to advance a few gymnasts to the State Meet.

The Girls' Track team had a very successful April running a great annual track meet on April 6. Our JV team came away from that meet taking 2nd place, and varsity battled hard as well. The Lady T-Bolts completed their regular season with some great personal best times and finishes at Bolingbrook

and Lincoln Way East. Our Lady T-Bolts prepare this month to head to the Homewood Flossmoor Sectional, hoping to get a few state qualifiers for the meet at EIU the weekend of May 16.

Outdoor season has begun for the Bolts. The first week of April brought fast times and lots of medals for the Bolts, who scored 108 points and took 2nd place at the Argo Invite on April 6. Currently, the Bolts have the #5 fastest 4x100m Relay team in the State and are looking to climb the chart the next few weeks. The relay team was made up of Senior Luke Watzke and Juniors John Bickel, Malachi Spells, and Mychah Spells. Another standout performance from the very young outdoor season was from Junior Jack Ballard, who had a 8 second improvement on his personal best time and ran a 2:01.3 in the 800m dash. The next few weeks are going to be filled with some of the best competitions in the state for the Bolts as they travel to Downers Grove South, Edwardsville, Sandburg, and Lockport Invites, all giving the Bolts opportunities to fine tune their skills as we get ready for Championship season in early May. Our Tennis program got off to a 2-0 start with victories over Crete Monee and Tinley Park. The team looks forward to the many challenges that May will bring. Due to an injury to our #1 player, the team will need to show extreme flexibility and creativity to accomplish the goals set at the start of the season. The Invitationals at U of I and Lincolnway East will make us tournament tough for Conference and Sectionals in May.

The Girls' Varsity Badminton team opened their Conference play in April with a record of 2-0. This was a very strong start for the team. Wins against Stagg and Bradley proved that the Bolts were determined to fight for the Conference title this year. After a struggling 2018 season, the girls have continually shown great work ethic, determination, and fight in practice and games this season! The girls are ready and looking to finish strong with the rest of their Conference games, two tough tournaments, and the Conference meet. #1 singles Sr. Nicole Bath, #2 Sr. Stella Martinez, #3 Sr. Allie Callham, and #4 Jr. Fatima Barajas have shown great strength and leadership in the singles line-up. Our doubles pairs keep fighting hard! Post season play begins the start of May. We are hoping to qualify 6 players at Sectionals and then make our way down to EIU for the State tournament!
